






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COVID-19

The Covid-19 pandemic has disrupted millions of lives across the world. Apart from the immediate risk to physical health, mental wellbeing was also affected, aggravating the uncertainty of the situation. Some have been lucky to win the battle against the virus, while several others have faced destructive consequences. The economic and social disruption caused by the pandemic was devastating. Busy streets were empty; industries, malls, bars, shops, entertainment venues, schools, colleges, and restaurants were closed to reduce the spread of the virus. National lockdowns, movement restriction, and closure of non-formal education opportunities resulted in a lack of social engagement among peers and educators. Nearly half of the global workforce lost their livelihood. Many were unable to feed themselves and their families as breadwinners lost their jobs and life. Some national health services stopped their routine work to concentrate on the COVID-19 cure. On the other hand, people with other conditions were reluctant to go to the hospital for fear of getting infected.





On 24 March 2020, approximately 500 confirmed positive cases of COVID-19 were reported in India. Prime Minister Narendra Modi declared a "Janta Curfew". In June 2020 India became the third-worst affected country worldwide. Inadequate numbers of hospital beds and ventilators and a lack of medical personnel led to high fatalities. The pandemic affected the entire food system by preventing farmers' access to the markets. The Indian economy was hit hard by unemployment due to the implementation of lockdown. The majority of the migrant workers in cities, especially daily wage earners, were rendered jobless overnight, which led them to migrate back to their villages. Due to no transportation facilities, thousands of migrant workers took to the roads towards their homes on foot. The already fragile public health facilities suffered tremendously due to less medical supplies and a high infection rate. Most of the health workers were working without protective equipment, masks, and sanitisers, exposing themselves to the infection. The imposition of lockdown also aggravated instability in the lives of the transgender community, the disabled, street children, sex workers, and others thus, creating obstacles in their efforts to earn a living. The pandemic harmed the poor and vulnerable the most, and it is threatening to push millions more into poverty.



COVID-19

Child Help Foundation (CHF) has been tirelessly working towards supporting the country's neediest citizens, most of whom belong to the underprivileged sections of society. We have been active at the forefront of distributing warm meals to 1800 individuals every day. Our team has also been distributing Ration Kits to support families and communities affected by the adverse implications of the pandemic.






Apart from COVID-19 patients, CHF also provided aid to children suffering from life-threatening diseases such as cancer. These children belonged to underprivileged families whose parents were already struggling to make ends meet and the lockdown affected them adversely by not being able to provide good treatment to their children. We bridged the divide that was hindering their treatment by getting them access to good medical facilities.





CHF also actively supported frontline workers and hospitals by providing them with life saving equipments like masks, sanitizers, gloves, PPE Kit and conducted several awareness drives to make people aware of keeping themselves and their families protected from the COVID19 virus.



FROM THE DESK OF THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



As we move into our 11th year, I want to thank each one of you for all the support and kindness. With the world constantly changing around us, we are moving ahead with a holistic approach to bring about changes in the educational, health, and humanitarian fields. We have been able to reach the lives of over 10 lakh people in a span of 10 years.

This year, our main aim was to provide humanitarian relief to a larger extent. 2020 was a year of global chaos and heightened mayhem. Before the nationwide lockdown was imposed, CHF's primary focus was to spread awareness about the COVID-19, which wasn't a popular conversation back then. Knowing the impact it would have on the world, we took precautionary measures to tackle the then-upcoming Corona monster.

During the lockdown, the quality of life dropped drastically as the poor were the most affected. Our mission expanded from just implementing the SDGs in our programs to coming up with new ways to embark upon the journey to fight the pandemic.

In our ongoing programs, we cater to over 500 Medical cases each year. Other divisions are catering to 2,224 individuals in the Education sector, 7,215 people under Clean Water and Sanitation, 9,64,868 under Humanitarian Relief and Rehabilitation, and thousands of beneficiaries under the Gender Equality sector. Apart from this, under our new programs Life on Land and Life Under Water, 52,433 stray animals were fed and 35,960 kilograms of waste has been collected.

Our Humanitarian Food Relief Project, "Rotighar" reached 6,01,352 individuals. Emergency Medical Support has been reaching underprivileged families of children with treatment support ever since the lockdown. Even though the majority of the hospitals were catering to COVID patients, CHF continued with the medical cases. In collaboration with the BMC, sanitary pad distribution was conducted in various community centers in Maharashtra, Kolkata, and Bangalore. We also conducted multiple street- plays in Mira Road, Maharashtra in collaboration with MBMC. CHF celebrated National Girl Child Day in Nagaland for the well-being and rights of children in collaboration with 41 Assam Rifles. During this Financial year, CHF was the recipient of various awards like the Dadasaheb Phalke International Film Festival Award for benevolent efforts.

Through this year's report, we would want to spread a message about finding and creating positivity even during the toughest times. We are grateful to all of you for being our pillars of strength. The CHF team is ready for the challenges and adventures that tomorrow has to offer!

We are excited and intently looking forward to eternal support!

We also promote menstrual hygiene to spread awareness among adolescent girls. CHF has constructed 72 toilets and WASH facilities in many schools, which have directly benefited 34,672 children.

Humanitarian Relief – Child Help Foundation has been at the forefront in responding to Natural Calamities. After the extensive devastation of the floods in Uttarakhand, Assam, Bihar, Kerala, and Odisha, our teams reached out to provide immediate relief to 10,31,763 affected victims.





SDG 14-Life Below Water





Child Help Foundation in the year 2019 -2020 began the new initiative of Beach Clean Ups with For Future India. We successfully removed plastics and other rubbish materials worth 185960 kgs from the beaches of Gorai, Manori, Velankanni, and Juhu. CHF has helped save 1,50,000 marine species.



SDG 15-Life on Land





Child Help Foundation in the year 2019- 2020 also undertook new programs like Life on Land partnered with Street Animals to feed stray animals in the Mira Bhayander Belt. We were able to provide food to 54,472 animals.



ORGANOGRAM





Key Highlights:

The year 2020-21 was tumultuous in many ways with lakhs of people losing their jobs, thousands of families losing their sole breadwinners and loved ones, and many children being forced to drop out of schools due to the pandemic. During these unprecedented times, Child Help Foundation (CHF), provided aid and support to many underprivileged individuals, in the form of ration kits, warm meals, and sanitation supplies. CHF also helped save the lives of children suffering from Cancer, Congenital Heart Defects, and other non – communicable diseases. We provided young underprivileged girls and women with sanitary napkins which were inaccessible to them due to the pandemic. In 2020 –21, we could touch the lives of 5,54,166 children.





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Emergency Medical Support:

- ☆ In this Financial Year, Child Help Foundation saved the lives of 72 children suffering from non-communicable diseases like cancer, or those who needed transplants, etc.
- On the occasion of World Cancer Day, a live session on Cancer Awareness was conducted on a global scale through Facebook.





Education Support:-

- ★ 1.225 students from Assam were equipped with stationery kits and other school supplies
 through the Back to School Initiative, which aimed at reigniting students' interest in school
 again.
- ★ 812 children from Child Care Institutions across the country were guaranteed Monthly Education Support.
- 17 students from underprivileged families were presented with scholarships to support their education.







Clean Water And Sanitation:-

- ★ 34,958 sanitary pads were distributed to a total of 4,944 beneficiaries in various locations across the country, to create awareness about the significance of Menstrual Hygiene and Management.
- 4,944 beneficiaries were reached under the Menstrual Hygiene awareness sessions conducted in Maharashtra, Karnataka, Nagaland, West Bengal, Assam, and Odisha.
- ☆ A Street play in collaboration with YUVA and MBMC (Mira Bhayander Municipal Corporation), on Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan, was conducted in three locations in Maharashtra. These plays sensitized 34 pedestrians in these locations.





Gender Equality:-

- The Recreate Team conducted a session on Empowerment Self-defence in the Child Help Foundation's Mumbai office. CHF's women employees were taught self-defense techniques to stand up for their Right to Live with Dignity.
- International Women's Day was celebrated among the staff of Child Help Foundation. Women employees were applauded and appreciated for their valuable work.
- ☆ On the occasion of Women's Day, two girl students enrolled in CHF's "Centre for Excellence" Program, under which they received extra coaching for their standard 10th exams.







Zero Hunger:-

61,790 children in Mumbai, Bangalore, Delhi, and Odisha were given cooked nutritious meals by Child Help Foundation, in partnership with Khushiyaan Foundation.





Humanitarian Relief:-

- 9,64,868 individuals in various cities of India were given warm meals and ration kits by Child Help Foundation, in partnership with Khushiyaan Foundation.
- 4,016 needy beneficiaries from West Bengal were provided with Ration and sanitation kits.
- ☆ 439 underprivileged people In Odisha were provided with woolen clothes during the winter season.



Life on Land:-

★ 52,433 stray cats, dogs, and, birds were fed, in partnership with Street Animals.



Life Below Water:-

Child Help Foundation, in partnership with For Future India Official, took up beach-cleaning initiatives. Under this, our volunteers cleaned 6 beaches of Mumbai and collected 35,960 kgs. of waste and debris.


















Emergency Medical Support

The United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), SDG-3 aims to ensure healthy lives and promote well-being at all ages. It is believed to be a prerequisite to sustainable development. Good health and Well-Being are all about ensuring healthy lives and promoting welfare among people of all ages. The target plan of SDG3 is to prevent the death of newborns and children by the year 2030. These goals are ingrained in the missions and initiatives of the non-profit organizations working for children. Child Help Foundation (CHF) is at the forefront in carrying out activities and initiatives focussed on ensuring wellness among children and enhancing their health.





Our Emergency Medical Support Program is our flagship program, through which we are committed to saving the lives of many underprivileged children. Child Help Foundation supports the treatment of children from poor economic backgrounds, thus bringing smiles to family members and saving the lives of children. We intend to increase the lifespan of children in the age group of 0-14 years. In 11 years, CHF has contributed in saving the lives of more than 1,000 children across India, and will continue towards this noble cause. Even during this pandemic, CHF has saved the lives of more than 100 children in the age group of 0-14 years.

Childhood Cancer

A cancer diagnosis is upsetting at any age, but especially so when the patient is a child. The most common types of cancer diagnosed in children in the ages 0-14 years are leukemia, brain and other central nervous systems (CNS) tumors, and lymphomas.


Cancer begins when healthy cells change and grow out of control. In most types of cancer, these cells form a mass called a tumor. A tumor can be cancerous or benign. A cancerous tumor is malignant, meaning it can grow and spread to other parts of the body. A benign tumor means the tumor can grow but will not spread to distant parts of the body.

Although the Indian healthcare system has developed immensely to bring down the number of childhood cancer cases, it still remains the major cause of death from the disease among children.

Children's cancer is not treated the same as adult cancer. Pediatric oncology is a medical specialty that focuses on the care of children with cancer. There are many types of treatments that depend on the type of cancer and how advanced it is. Very common treatments include surgery, Chemotherapy, radiation therapy, immunotherapy, and Stem Cell transplant. The causes of most childhood cancers are not known. About 5% of all cancers in children are caused by an inherited mutation (a genetic mutation that can be passed from parents to their children). The major symptoms noticed are weight loss, swelling, formation of lumps, frequent infections, recurring fever and pain in bones, joints & legs.

Child Help Foundation:

Child Help Foundation (CHF) believes that no child should die at the very beginning of their life. Under its flagship program, Emergency Medical Support, CHF has and continues to support many underprivileged children suffering from cancer. We have multiple tie-ups with several hospitals, where children suffering from cancer are admitted for treatment. If the patients belong from poor households and are unable to afford the treatments, these hospitals then refer the cancer patients to CHF for financial support.

Childhood Cancer

The cases that are referred to Child Help Foundation are presented on our website. A team of tele-callers are involved in raising finances for the treatment of these children. Alongside an advertisement is run on various social media platforms to give exposure for the case and to raise the required funds. Child Help Foundation to date has supported the treatment of more than 500 children suffering from cancer.

Referral systems:

The cases supported by Child Help Foundation are often referred to by the partner hospitals through doctors and Medical Social Workers (MSWs). When a child is diagnosed with a life-threatening disease like cancer, the biggest dilemma that arises in front of their parents is to arrange the finances required for the treatment. This is where CHF comes in and raises funds to support the lesser fortunate patients with financial aid and emotional support in the form of counseling.

Follow-ups:

Child Help Foundation regularly follows up on the patients' health throughout the treatment phase and also after the treatment is done. Our medical coordinators' team keeps in touch with the patients' families to track the overall improvement of the child, to know whether he/she needs further assistance.

Networking with hospitals:

Child Help Foundation has an extensive network with hospitals across India. CHF works seamlessly to get in touch with the best doctors, nurses, and medical professionals. Our tie-ups are with the best hospitals with advanced tools and machines to provide the best treatment to the children.








1. Annliyan Anthony





Before After

Annliyan Anthony, a 7-year-old boy, is the younger son of Anthony Raju (father) and Linda Anthony (mother), who suffers from Steroid Resistant Nephrotic Syndrome. Annliyan had been suffering from seizures since the age of 3 years. He was admitted to Lourdes Hospital, Kerala, every time he suffered seizures, which was often. After years of treatment, he got diagnosed with Steroid Resistant Nephritic syndrome. After being diagnosed, doctors said that Annliyan would require an ICU stay along with medications to fix his syndrome which would cost ₹ 2,50,000. Annliyan's Father is a daily wage laborer and his mother is a housewife and was not able to afford the treatment cost. The Child Help Foundation (CHF) team raised funds after talking to the Medical Social Worker(MSW) and supported the child throughout his treatment. Currently, Annliyan is at home. He has been treated for his syndrome and his health is good and is showing improvements.







2. Athul Renjith





Before After

Athul Renjith is a 10-year-old boy, suffering from Posterior Fossa Arachnoid Cyst. He is the younger son of Renjith P.A. who works as a house painter and his mother Jolly John is a housewife. A few years back, Athul had suffered from bone cancer. He had to undergo chemotherapy and other suggested treatments for his recovery. He recovered from his cancer but was soon diagnosed with 3 cysts and fluid formation in his brain through his medical reports. Doctors said that he would require an Excision Biopsy and follow-up treatment to fix his condition which would cost ₹ 3,00,000. Athul's father, being the only earning person in the family of 6 members, with very little income was not able to afford the cost of his son's surgery. The MSW (Medical Social Worker) in the hospital called Child Help Foundation (CHF) for supporting the parents. After the necessary verifications, CHF supported Athul by raising the required funds. Athul's surgery was done in Caritas Hospital, Kerala. He is recovering and his health is in better condition now.







3. Fathima Naguava





Before After

4-month-old Fathima Naguava is the daughter of Jabbar Pathechetta and Shahnaz Begum. After a coconut fell on her head, she was diagnosed with head trauma. The doctors said that she would require re-exploration Craniotomy and evacuation of Hematoma treatment which will cost ₹ 4,00,000/-. Fathima's father is physically impaired and hence, livelihood is a challenge for the family. All the expenses of her family are taken care of by her uncle. Her parents couldn't raise the funds and contacted CHF for financial support. After necessary verifications, CHF assured the parents and helped them raise funds for Fathima's treatment. After the treatment, Fathima is gradually recovering from her injuries.







4. Abhijeet





Before After

Abhijeet is the only son of Ambika (mother), a 12-year-old boy who suffers from bilateral undescended testes. Doctors said that he would require bilateral Orchiopexy surgery to fix his condition which would cost ₹ 70,000. He is looked after by his mother who works as a sweeper in a bank. Abhijeet's father passed away a few years ago. It was difficult for his mother to afford Abhijeet's treatment with her low income. The CHF team raised funds after talking to the MSW and supported the family throughout the treatment. Abhijeet is at home now and has recovered after his surgery.







5. Baby of Ambily





Before After

The baby of Rajesh, who is a daily wage laborer, and Ambily (mother), who is a housewife was diagnosed with extreme prematurity and low birth weight. The treatment cost was ₹3,50,000. Being the only earning person in the family, the father was not able to bear the expenses of his baby's treatment and thus, contacted CHF for financial support. After necessary verifications, CHF helped the parents to raise funds for their baby's treatments. Currently, the baby is at home and has recovered.







6. Baby of Anita Kumari





Before After

The only baby of Anita Kumari, suffers from Extreme Prematurity. The mother is a housewife and the father Avdesh Kumar Thakur works in a private company in Bihar and tries to make the ends meet with a very low income. The family lives in a small village in Bihar.Doctors said that he would require more than 2 weeks of NICU stay and ventilator support to recover which would cost ₹ 2,50,000. After talking to the doctors in Swastik Hospital, Faridabad, the CHF team raised funds and supported the child throughout the treatment. Currently, the baby is at home and has recovered.







7. Baby Adhiya

Before

Baby Adhiya was a premature baby, born to Arshad (father) and Ansiya (mother). Doctors said that she would require ventilator support for one month to recover which would cost ₹3,00,000. The baby was admitted to Lourdes hospital. Baby's father is a driver and mother is a housewife. Her father is the only earning person in the family and couldn't afford the cost of her treatment. After knowing the financial condition of the family, the MSW from Lourdes Hospital, Kerala, contacted Child Help Foundation for supporting the child's treatment. After the necessary verifications, CHF raised the required funds for the baby's treatment. Currently, the baby is at home and has gained 4kgs of weight.







8. Twin Daughters of K.Mir Muqtadir Ali



Before

The twin daughters of K.Mir Muqtadir Ali (father) and Gazala Shireen (mother), were diagnosed with extreme prematurity and low birth weight with respiratory distress. The treatment was estimated to be ₹ 12,00,000. The father is the only earning member of the family who works as a daily wage laborer and lost his job during the pandemic. The twins were born in Shantabai Nursing Home, Hyderabad, and were then shifted to Hope Hospital, Hyderabad, for further treatment where they were admitted to the NICU. The family was in a financial crisis and was not in a state to afford the medical expenses of the babies' treatment and approached CHF for financial help and support. After necessary verifications, CHF assured the parents and helped them raise funds for the twin's treatments. Today the baby sisters are healthier and have gained weight.








9. Zanieb





Before After

Zanieb was diagnosed with Congenital heart disease, at birth, the treatment cost of which was ₹ 4 lakhs. The father, Mr. Haroon Shaikh, works as a daily wage laborer, and the mother, Mrs. Heena Shaikh is a housewife. Since the diagnosis, the baby was kept in NICU (Neonatal intensive care unit) in Bai Jerbai Wadia Hospital, Parel, Mumbai. She had difficulty in breathing. The parents got in touch with the CHF team for support. After necessary verifications, CHF assured the parents and helped them raise funds for their baby's treatments. After the funds were collected the baby's surgery was done. Currently, the baby is at home. She has recovered completely.







10. Baby of Vidya





Before After

The baby of Vidya and Sachin Tayde was diagnosed with a Congenital Heart Defect while she was in the womb and had to undergo multiple surgeries to get it treated. During the 5th month of pregnancy, the mother, Mrs. Vidya had undergone some medical tests through which she got to know that her baby was suffering from congenital heart disease. The baby was born but had extreme difficulty in breathing. The baby underwent her first heart surgery on the 8th day since her birth. She underwent her second surgery at the age of 8 months only. The doctors treating her suggested Branch PA Balloon dilation/ stenting treatment, as the previous surgeries did not help with her recovery. For her third surgery, the doctors estimated the treatment cost would go up to ₹ 4,00,000. The father works as a housekeeper and is the only earning member of the family. The parents couldn't raise the funds and contacted CHF for financial support. After necessary verifications, CHF raised the required funds to help the baby. After the surgery, the baby's health showed signs of improvement. She got healthier and was named Shreya.







11. Iqra Ismail





Before After

Iqra Ismail, a 13-year-old girl who is the daughter of Mr. Ismail Shaikh (father) and Mrs. Najiya Shaikh (mother), had been suffering from back pain from a very young age. When taken to the doctor, it was detected that she had an abnormal curve in the backbone which caused her to lean on one side and caused her back pain. The doctor diagnosed her with Dorsal Scoliosis, which would require a Scoliosis Correction surgery to fix her spine defect. The treatment cost was ₹ 7,00,000. Iqra's father, a driver, is the only earning member in their family of 4 and has no financial support from elsewhere. The MSW understood the family's financial background and contacted Child Help Foundation to support Iqra's treatment. After visiting the family and completing the necessary verifications, CHF supported the child by raising the required finances for her treatment. Iqra's treatment was done in Nanavati Hospital, Mumbai. She was discharged from the hospital after the surgery and is on her path to a speedy recovery.







12. Navneeth K.P.





Before After

Navneeth K.P, a 6-year-old boy, is the son of Mr. Parmesh KN and Mrs. Manjula. He suffered from Congenital Severe Thoracolumbar Kyphoscoliosis. Doctors said that he would require Posterior instrumentation, Vertebral column resection, deformity correction, and fusion under neuromonitoring surgery to fix his curved spine disorder which would cost ₹ 5,00,000. Navneeth's Father is a Farmer and his mother is a housewife. They couldn't manage to raise the required funds for his treatment. A year ago, Navneeth was taken to Bhagwan Mahaveer Jain Hospital, Bangalore, for Spinal Curve. He was treated in Bhagwan Mahaveer Jain Hospital under the supervision of Dr. Raghavendra Rao D. After talking to the doctors and MSW, the CHF team raised funds and supported the child throughout the treatment. Navneeth was discharged from the hospital post his surgery and is recovering from his condition.







13. Dibya Sutar





Before After

Dibya Sutar, the only son of Mr. Prasantha (father) and Parbati (mother) is a 10-year-old boy, who suffers from Acute Encephalitis Syndrome with Precocious Puberty. Doctors said that he would require 2 weeks of hospitalization along with other treatments to fix the condition which would cost ₹ 2,07,250.Dibya's father is a carpenter and his mother is a housewife. Since a very small age, Dibya suddenly started suffering from high fevers. Later, he also started getting seizures. He would go into an unconscious state when he suffered seizures. Dibya was taken to KIMS Hospital, Bhubaneswar, where it was diagnosed that the left side of his brain was affected, making one side of his body non-functional. His father being the only earning member in the family could not arrange the money needed for his treatment. The CHF team raised funds after talking to the doctors and supported the child throughout the treatment. Currently, Dibya is discharged from the hospital and is showing signs of recovery.







14. Baby of Mrs. Krishna





Before After

The baby of Mrs. Krishna and Mr. Vikas was diagnosed with extreme prematurity and life-threatening sepsis. He was admitted to Swastik Hospital, Faridabad, and needed NICU stay for his recovery, which could cost ₹ 3,00,000/-. Baby's father is unemployed and his mother is a housewife. All the expenses of the family are looked after by his grandfather. The parents couldn't raise the funds required for his treatment and hence, contacted CHF for financial support. After necessary verifications, the team of CHF raised the required funds for his treatments. The child is currently at home and has recovered completely and has gained 9kgs weight. He is now named Saransh.








15. Soham Lokre





Before After

3-year-old Soham Lokre is the youngest son of Mr. Shahu Lokre and Mrs. Shaila Lokre. He suffers from Congenital Heart Disease. Soham used to suffer from constant colds and coughs. A friend of Soham's father suggested they go to Balaji Hospital, Mumbai, to get this treated. Doctors said that he would require ICR with ASD closure surgery to fix his heart defect which would cost ₹ 2,25,000.Soham's father was the only earning person in the family of 5, and was not able to afford the cost of his son's treatment. After getting in touch with CHF, they asked our team for financial help. The CHF team raised the required funds after talking to the MSW and supported the child throughout the treatment. Soham has now recovered completely and is now living a better life.








16. Darshan

The baby's doctors had suggested that the baby be kept in NICU for 3 weeks which would cost up to ₹ 2,50,000. The baby was admitted to Children's Hospital, Mumbai. The baby is currently at home and has recovered completely.








17. Baby of Usman





Before After

The baby of Usman and Mariam Shaikh, who works as a laborer and housewife respectively, was born prematurely with respiratory distress. the treatment cost was ₹ 2,70,000. The parents couldn't raise the funds and contacted CHF for financial support. After necessary verifications, CHF assured the parents and helped them raise funds for their son's treatments. The baby was admitted to Veena Hospital, Mumbai, and was kept on ventilator support for 3 weeks. The baby is currently at home and has recovered. The baby has gained 4kgs of weight.

The 30 day-old boy of Washid and Nilofer Qureshi is their only son. Since birth, he has suffered from prematurity and respiratory distress. Doctors said that he would require two months of NICU stay which would cost ₹ 8,50,000. Baby's father works in a cold storage and his mother is a housewife. Washid is the only earning member in the family and found it difficult to arrange money for his baby's treatmentThe CHF team raised funds after talking to the doctors and supported the child throughout the treatment. At present, the child is at home and has recovered completely.








19. Aaradhya Sathe





Before After

Aaradhya Sathe, the 5-year-old daughter of Mr.Sanjay and Rina Sathe, is the youngest among her siblings. She has an elder brother of 15 years and an elder sister of 17 years. Her father works in a petrol pump with a very low income and her mother is a housewife. She suffers from Thalassemia Major. Doctors said that she would require a Bone Marrow Treatment (BMT) surgery to fix Thalassemia which would cost ₹ 10,50,000. When CHF was notified about this case by the MSW, the team did a thorough background check and started raising funds to help the little girl. Aaradhya's sister was her BMT donor. Her Bone Marrow Transplant was done in Kokilaben Dhirubhai Ambani Hospital, Mumbai. After the transplant, she was kept under observation for about 22 days in the BMT ward. Aradhya's BMT was successful and she is gradually recovering.







20. Dhyan





Before After

Dhyan, the 5-year-old boy of Sreejith G.P (father) and Dhanya (mother) suffers from severe burns. On 25th December 2020, an accident set Dhyan's house on fire. His family was caught in the fire and suffered from a high percentage of burns. The family was immediately admitted to Government Medical College and later shifted to a KIMS Hospital, Bhubaneswar, for better treatment. Unfortunately, a few days later, Dhyan's mother succumbed to severe burn injuries. Dhyan was later shifted to Lourdes hospital for further treatment. Doctors said that he would require a Skin Grafting surgery to fix his wounds which would cost ₹ 5,00,000. Dhyan's father works as a lab technician and could not afford his treatment. After talking to the doctors and MSW, the CHF team raised funds and supported the child and his family throughout the treatment. Dhyan has undergone 6 skin grafting surgeries. He is currently at home and recovering from physical wounds. He is under the care of his guardian who is looking after Dhyan's physical as well as mental health recovery.








21. Tanuj Mandol





Before After

Tanuj Mandol is a 1-year-old boy, who is the only son of Binod Mandol (father) and Priyanka Mandol (mother). He suffers from Hirschsprung disease. Doctors said that he would require a laparoscopic biopsy followed by a pull-through surgery to fix his condition which would cost ₹1,90,000. Just after 8 days of his birth, Tanuj had to undergo a bypass surgery so that the waste could be removed from his body. Later he was treated in CMC Vellore Hospital, Vellore. Tanuj's Father works as a laborer and his mother is a housewife. The CHF team raised funds after talking to the doctors and supported the child throughout the treatment. Post the surgery, he is gradually recovering and is in a better health condition now.







22. Priya Pawar





Before After

Priya Pawar, a 13-year-old, is the only daughter of Late Mr.Praveen Pawar and Mrs.Vaishali Pawar. She suffers from Congenital Heart Disease. Priya lost her father 2 years ago, and she has been raised by her single mother since then. Priya's uncle takes care of all their expenses as her mother is a housewife. Priya had been suffering from frequent colds and coughs along with breathlessness and high heart rates. Concerned about her health, Priya's mother consulted a doctor for treatment. After thorough consultations, the doctors said that she would require Total Correction (ICR) Heart surgery to fix her heart defect which would cost ₹ 4,92,230. The CHF team got in touch with the doctors and decided to support the child throughout the treatment, after background verifications. Her treatment then started in Jehangir Hospital, Pune.

Priya's surgery was successfully done. She is now recovering.







34. Twins of Rajeshree






Before After

Riya and Priya are the twins of Rajeshree who were born in the 8th month of pregnancy. The babies were diagnosed with low weight and respiratory distress at birth. Their doctors had suggested the babies be kept in NICU for at least 1 month. The cost of the babies' treatment was ₹ 12,00,000. The twins were admitted to Utkal Hospital, Bhubaneswar, but were later shifted to Hi-Tech Medical College, Bhubaneswar, for better treatment. The twins' father, Mr. Rajes was working with a private company but had to switch to farming as he lost his job due to the pandemic, and their mother, Rajeshree is a housewife. Rajes earns very little and was not able to manage the expense of the treatment as all his savings had already been drained for his babies' earlier treatment. The family contacted Child Help Foundation for financial assistance.

CHF supported the treatment of the twins. The twins have now recovered completely.







24. Twins of Nikhitha





Before After

The twins of Nikhitha were 12-day old baby boys born in the eighth month of pregnancy. Their father, Mr. Srijith works as a barber and their mother, Nikhitha is a housewife. Mr. Srijith is the only earning member in the family. Nikhitha had noticed some bleeding during her pregnancy. During the 8th month of pregnancy, she was rushed to the hospital as she experienced excessive bleeding. That is when she gave birth to the twins, who were preterm and weighed unusually less. The babies were admitted to Amrita Institute, Kochi where they were kept in the NICU for 4 weeks along with Ventilator support and medicines. The estimated cost of the twin's treatment was ₹ 4,00,000. The family was unable to raise the required funds for the twins' treatment. The doctors treating the twins suggested the family to contact Child Help Foundation for support. After necessary verifications, CHF supported their treatment. The babies, now named Arnav and Arav, have recovered and are healthier.








25. Twins of Maneesha





Before After

Twins of Maneesha were 4-day old premature baby boys born in the 6th month of pregnancy. Babies' father, Mr. Nixon works as a mason, and their mother is a housewife. The twins were admitted to Lourdes hospital, Kochi, where they were kept in the NICU for 2 months and were given ventilator care. The babies were given IV Fluids, IV antibiotics, medicines, and nutritional supplements. The estimated cost of the treatment for baby 1 was ₹ 5,00,000 and for baby 2 was ₹ 4,00,000. Their father, being the only earning member in the family, was not able to bear the expenses of his children's treatment. On the doctor's advice, the father contacted Child Help Foundation for support. After necessary verifications, CHF supported the treatment of the babies. The babies are healthier now and are named Evan Nixon and Yuvan Nixon.







26. Baby of Reshma Anoob





Before After

The baby of Reshma Anoob was a month-old premature baby girl. Her father works as a cleaner in the Kerala Municipal Corporation on a temporary basis and her mother is a homemaker. She is their firstborn baby. During her pregnancy, Reshma was being treated in the Kakkanad Co-operative Hospital. The couple was undergoing treatment for infertility in this hospital. Reshma experienced bleeding during the 6th month of her pregnancy and was admitted for treatment. Later, she was transferred to Rajagiri Hospital for better treatment. On December 5th, 2020 Reshma delivered a baby girl. The doctors advised the baby to be given Ventilator Support and she was taken to the NICU soon after her birth. The baby's lungs were too weak and her organs were underdeveloped. She was diagnosed with extreme prematurity, extremely low birth weight, and Respiratory Distress syndrome. She was undergoing treatment for two months till she recovered and started breathing normally. The estimated cost of her treatment was ₹ 12, 00,000. The father's minimal income wasn't sufficient enough to bear the expense of his child's treatment and sought support from CHF. The baby is named Aaradhya. She is now healthier and has gained sufficient weight.








27. Dakshraj Jadeja





Before After

Dakshraj Jadeja is a 7-year-old boy who was diagnosed with blood cancer in March 2020. His blood count was detected to be low since the age of 5. When he was diagnosed with blood cancer, both his parents were extremely worried about his deteriorating health. Mr. Rajendrasinh Jadeja (father) works as a security guard and Neetaba Jadeja (mother) is a housewife. With the help of family and friends, Dakshraj's parents were able to manage some amount for his Chemotherapy. He contacted CHF for support. Dakshraj has completed his Cycles of Chemotherapy and is currently undergoing follow-up for his treatment.







28. Baby Gurpreet





Before After

Baby Gurpreet is a 1-year-old boy from Haryana. He is the only son of Mr. Satish Singh and Mrs. Priyanka. Gurpreet's father is a farmer and his mother is a housewife. Gurpreet was born with multiple contractures making him unable to move his wrists and legs. When taken to the doctor, Gurpreet was suggested to undergo surgery to correct his deformity. Gurpreet had undergone corrective surgery for his legs. That is when he could stand, but is still unable to walk. According to the doctors, this development will be seen gradually. Later, he was suggested to undergo corrective surgery for his wrist. The estimated cost of his treatment was ₹ 2,00,000. His treatment was done in Orthomed Hospital, Hisar. Gurpreet underwent 2 correction surgeries for his wrist. He is gradually recovering and able to move his wrist.








29. Leela





Before After

Leela is the 1-year-old daughter of Mr.Prakash, who is a Domestic helper with a very low income. Being the family's only breadwinner, Leela's father is unable to meet all the household expenses. Her mother, Mrs. Sita, is a housewife. Leela was 4 months old when her parents noticed that she was able to see only with one eye. This is when her parents took her to a doctor. After some tests, the doctor said that there was a 99% chance of Leela suffering from eye cancer. Leela has completed her treatment and is gradually recovering. Doctors have said that she will regain her sight eventually.








30. Baby of Tamanna





Before After

Mrs. Tamanna's baby was born in the 8th month of her pregnancy, with extremely low birth weight. She only weighed 1.2 kgs and also suffered from acute kidney injury and sepsis at the time of birth. Siddhi is the 7-year-old daughter of Mr. Prasad Das and Mrs. Deepa Das. Siddhi's Father works at a chicken shop and her mother is a housewife. Since a very young age, Siddhi has been suffering from headaches frequently. She was then taken to a doctor for examination and after multiple tests, the doctors discovered a brain tumor. Siddhi's father consulted several doctors for her treatment. She has undergone multiple surgeries for her tumor, but it keeps reoccurring, leaving Siddhi in tremendous pain. Later her treatment was done in Manipal Hospital, where she underwent surgery as a part of her treatment. The cost of her treatment is ₹ 9,00,000. Siddhi's father earns little and was not able to afford the treatment cost. He approached Child Help Foundation for support. After the necessary verifications, CHF supported Siddhi's treatment. Siddhi underwent surgery for excision of her tumor after which she was admitted to the hospital for 2 months. She has recovered from her tumor but due to multiple surgeries and medications. Siddhi has lost her vision partially.







32. Niharika





Before After

Niharika is the 6-month-old baby girl of Mr. Raghuvendra Jadhav, a farmer, and Mrs. Durga Jadhav, a housewife. She is their only child. At her birth, Niharika was diagnosed with heart disease and was admitted twice as she suffered from pneumonia. She also suffered from difficulty in breathing and could not be fed properly as she experienced fatigue. The doctors treating her suggested that she will get better treatment in Balaji Heart hospital and Diagnostic Center, Mumbai. She was then shifted to Balaji hospital, Mumbai. Her surgery was performed successfully on 18th March 2021. The cost of her surgery was ₹ 2,75,000. Niharika's father being a farmer and the only earning member in the family was not able to afford the cost of her treatment and sought support from CHF.








33. Ayush Raj

The twins of Neha Iyer were 20-days old baby girls. Born premature, one baby was suffering from sepsis, jaundice and the other baby was suffering from leg ulcers and low weight at birth. Their father, Mr. Subramani E worked as a real estate broker, who, unfortunately, lost his job during the pandemic. The baby girls were admitted to Vasavi Hospital, Bangalore. The doctors treating them advised them a treatment involving a NICU stay for 5 weeks and along with IV fluids and IV antibiotics. One of the babies' leg ulcers was treated under general anesthesia and collagen dressing. The estimated cost of the twins' treatment was ₹ 14,00,000. Their father, being unemployed, was left helpless and unable to bear the expenses of the babies' treatment. The family approached CHF to support their children's treatment. The babies have gained weight, post their treatment, and are healthier.








35. Dhruvika

He was taken to the doctor but could not recover despite several days of medication. Ali's family was suggested to visit one of the hospitals in Nasik. After several medical tests, Ali was diagnosed with Thalassemia Major. He had to undergo a blood transfusion every month. Later, Ali was shifted to Kokilaben Dhirubhai Ambani Hospital, Mumbai for his Bone Marrow transplant. The estimated cost of his treatment is Rs. 9, 00,000. Ali's father, being the only earning person in the family of 4, is not able to bear the expenses of his son's treatment. He has approached CHF for help.



Rayan, a 7-month-old boy, is one of the twins of Mr. Abdul Lateef (father) and Mrs. Mubashira A P (mother). His father works as a driver and his mother is a housewife. Rayan's parents conceived the twins after 8 years of infertility. They underwent 2 years of treatment to conceive the babies. The twins were born through IVF. Two months after birth, Rayan started losing weight, unlike his very healthy twin. His parents also noticed that their baby was turning pale due to the lack of blood in his body. His father took him to various doctors for treatment. He also went through a blood transfusion many times.



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Krutika Mahajan





Her parents took her to G.S Bhurle Hospital- Basava Kalyan (Bidar), where the Doctor asked the family to get a White Blood Cells and Platelets check-up for the baby. She was admitted to the hospital for 6 days. After severe complications, the doctors at G.S Bhurle Hospital referred the baby to the doctors at Rainbow Children's Hospital, Hyderabad for further treatment. As a permanent cure, she needs to undergo chemotherapy. Ever since his baby's disease was diagnosed, Priyanka's father hasn't taken even a day's leave. He knows that every penny he loses will cause a serious threat to his precious daughter's life. Her parents are in no position to arrange Rs 10,00,000 to save their baby's life. Her parents are in desperate need of funds to save their child.



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Shashi Gupta



Shashi Gupta is a 3-year-old boy of Mr. Amit Gupta and Mrs. Arti Gupta. Shashi is the youngest among his siblings and has two elder brothers Bandhan (7) and Yash (5). His father works as a driver with a very low income and his mother is a housewife. At the age of 2, Shashi started running fevers frequently. He would recover temporarily with medications but would get a fever again. Soon, Shashi's mother noticed dark spots developing on his body. He was immediately rushed to the local hospital. Medical tests were done after which Shashi got diagnosed with blood cancer. He was then shifted to Rainbow Children's Hospital, Hyderabad, for better treatment. The estimated cost of her treatment is Rs. 6,00,000. Shashi's father, being the only earning person in the family of 7, is not able to bear the expenses of his son's treatment.



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Aditi Shinde



Aditi Shinde is the 13-year-old daughter of Mr. Kailas and Mrs. Ashwini Shinde. Her father works in a company on a contractual basis and is the only earning member in the family of 6 members. Aditi has 2 younger siblings, Anushka (8) and Arush (4). In January 2020, Aditi started suffering from colds and coughs and also complained about chest pain. After sonography was done to examine the exact cause of pain, she was diagnosed with Osteosarcoma (Bone Cancer). The doctors at HCG Manavta Hospital have suggested Aditi undergo Radiation and chemotherapy. The total cost of her treatment is Rs. 3,50,000. Her family is financially weak and has asked CHF for help.

Kaustubh Karande




Child Care Institutions

Since the past decade, Child Help Foundation (CHF) has been working on a pan-India level, towards the achievement of Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) set by the United Nations (UN). In the year 2020-2021, CHF transformed the lives of more than 800 underprivileged children by ensuring inclusive and quality education through its Education Support Programme.




















Back To School Program

We believe that education is one of the most important aspects of development for an individual, which in turn results in the nation's development. CHF is involved in the noble cause of providing primary education at the grassroots level to the economically backward sections of society. We have supported the education of 812 children through our 11 Child Care Institutions (CCIs) across the country.

In the past year, we have conducted a number of activities for children across these CCIs. There were special day celebrations like Teacher's day, Women's day, Republic Day, and Independence Day among many more. Several educational and fun activities like drawing competitions, dance competitions, and elocution competitions were also conducted. The CCIs had also organized a few sessions to raise awareness in children about social evils like early child marriages, importance of child safety education and counseling sessions to promote mental health.

Child Help Foundation (CHF) in partnership with Xondhan Foundation, distributed kits consisting of educational materials like pencils, coloring books, textbooks, erasers as well as sanitary napkins to students, under its 'Back to School Initiative' to motivate students to attend school post the lockdown period. CHF aims to provide equal opportunities to all children. Many underprivileged children in India fail to receive Quality Education due to their socio-economic status, lack of access to schools, and the low value placed on education by their parents. With the declining number of COVID-19 cases reported in Guwahati, Assam, the schools reopened and regular classes began in January 2021 for students after a long gap of 10 months. With the schools shut due to lockdown, many students didn't have access to online learning and were out of touch with their study routine. CHF conducted the Back To School event in 3 schools in Assam Adingiri LP School, Adingiri, Guwahati, Assam.533 No Haripur Boalimari LP School, Bongaigaon, Assam.Borsajai ME School, Bashistha, Guwahati, Assam. CHF distributed education kits which included drawing books, exercise books, pens, pencils, eraser, scale, and crayons to motivate these kids to go back to school, with confidence and joy. The girls were made aware of the health benefits associated with following proper menstrual hygiene. As part of the awareness program, CHF also distributed sanitary napkins.





Back To School Program


The Back to School initiative was a great success and CHF was able to reach 1225 students.India is home to the largest population of 287 million illiterate adults in the world. This rate represents 37% of the total global illiterate adults. Despite the economic growth, India is one of the countries that is still struggling with the illiteracy problem. The advent of COVID-19 has further pushed the weaker sections of society into poverty. It has inadvertently forced the parents to focus more on survival than the education of children. Education may not eradicate all problems, but it is a means by which we can change the status quo of India from being a "Developing Nation" to a "Developed Nation."





Outcome

The "Back to School" program was a success as it was organized, as soon as the first lockdown was lifted. The children felt demotivated to get back to their regular schooling schedule and needed a push. The educational kits with new stationeries reignited their interest to attend school. These children were encouraged to draw on their own, paint, and participate in more class activities. Many children were a part of this initiative. These educational kits made the underprivileged children feel at par with the children in other schools and created equal opportunities amongst them. This program relieved the parents and teachers of their burdens to motivate the kids to attend school regularly.







Scholarship Support





Under the Inclusive Education program, CHF has been promoting primary education among disadvantaged children. Over the years, we have supported students from economically weaker families with scholarships to complete their education. The parents of these kids usually work as daily wage laborers or are domestic workers. Many of them approach CHF seeking help for their child's educational future. The CHF team ensures a proper background check, by visiting these houses, before granting aid, so that our initiative reaches the grassroots level. In the year 2020-21, CHF has provided support to 17 children from various schools in the country. We aim to make better citizens out of children, by providing them with proper educational facilities.











CFE SUCCESS STORY

CHF's Center For Excellence (CFE) program was started as a pilot project in Sakhare Ashram Shala, Vikramgad, Palghar. The Jawhar Block constitutes the high presence of most of the tribal people of 89.99%. The main aim was to support and develop students' interests in various subjects and aid them in choosing their career paths efficiently. Through our CFE program, we arranged extra classes under well-trained faculties, for English, Maths, and Science, for students of class 10th. According to a baseline survey in 2018, it was observed that the school's SSC board result was 80% and that these students were weak in subjects like English, Mathematics, and Science. In the academic year 2019-2020, CHF began conducting extra classes for these students and witnessed 100% results in the board exams. In order to aid their education, CHF also distributed Tablet PCs to facilitate digital learning and technological understanding.





Success Stories:

Bharati Dumada and Kanchan Dumada, two sisters, studying in the Sakhare Residential School, were a part of the CFE project. They studied very hard and scored the highest ranks in their SSC Board Examinations. Kanchan scored 91.60% and stood 1st, and her sister Bharati, scored 86.60% and stood on 2nd. Both the sisters scored significantly well by combining the extra coaching along with their own hard work. According to the school's superintendent, the school building does not have enough facilities. The school's residential wing, for girls from class 1 to class 10, is not spacious enough to accommodate all students comfortably. 8-10 girls share the same room. Amidst all the difficulties, the Dumada sisters managed to keep their dedication intact and studied day and night for their exams. On the occasion of Women's Day, both the girls were felicitated by Taj Hotels and Taj Sats with gifts, and their achievement was celebrated.







NANHE KALAM PROGRAM

The year 2020-21 has been a year that has taught us to plan better and to be always ready to face calamities as a collective and strong community. This year students were unable to go to school and their experience of "learning from home" began.





These pandemic times were even more difficult for the children who did not have access to proper resources. It created a "Digital Divide," resulting in a dip in the students' learning abilities. Students from the underprivileged communities were at the most risk.





Child Help Foundation, in partnership with Self Reliant India (SRI), has been involved since 2018, in the Nanhe Kalam Program to prepare the underprivileged students of the Nuh district of Haryana. The pandemic has left these children with minimum or no opportunities to prepare for the entrance tests of Jawahar Navodyay Vidyalayas (JNVs).





NANHE KALAM PROGRAM

Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas (JNVs) are a system of central schools for talented students predominantly from rural areas in India. They are run by Navodaya Vidyalaya Samiti, New Delhi, an autonomous organization under the Department of School Education and Literacy, Ministry of Education, Government of India.

Our Nanhe Kalam Program not only created opportunities for students but also, for the youth of these communities to train them to become teachers. This year with the online schooling model, we used the mixed approach of Micro-Learning Centers and Online Video-Based Learning to reach effectively to our kids. The main objective of this year's intervention was not only to reach students but also to increase the conversion ratio and get access to quality education.



In the FY 2020-21, we established 7 learning centers, across Haryana, wherein a total of 80 students were trained. Out of the 7 centers, 2 centers were supported through educational materials and curriculum.

Apart from this, 5 Capacity Building Workshops for training teachers, were initiated. Through these, 6 youngsters were fully trained to teach these students further.

With all the challenges related to reaching out to students, the number of working days, and the risks created by the Pandemic, we are hoping for a positive result for the students of this district in 2021 -22.



























CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION (SDG6)


By the year 2030, the United Nations (UN) Sustainable Development Goal 6 (SDG-6) wants everyone to achieve access to adequate and equitable sanitation and hygiene, paying considerable attention to the girls and women in vulnerable situations. Only by providing safe and dignified menstruation practices to women from all spheres of life, can the goal of SDG 6 be achieved.





Menstrual hygiene management (MHM) refers to the management of hygiene associated with the process of menstruation. WASH is an acronym used worldwide for "Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene". Women and girls continue to be subjected to multiple challenges when it comes to MHM, due to things like taboos; norms, and practices; a lack of access to accurate information; poor access to sanitary products, and poor access to WASH facilities. The real-life consequences of this can affect a girl's education, as well as some of her other rights, including her right to equality, health, and dignity.

International Organizations like the World Health Organization (WHO) and United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) believe that there is a need to reach out-of-school children, their parents, community leaders, and other men and women with accurate information on menstruation and MHM, good practices and options. Women and adolescent girls in India need clean Menstrual Management Products to collect their menstrual blood, as well as access to soap and water to clean themselves as required. They also need to have access to safe and convenient facilities to dispose off used menstrual management materials.







CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION (SDG6)

Child Help Foundation (CHF) has been working towards providing girls and women from helpless areas with access to menstrual hygiene materials like sanitary napkins and clean washrooms. These sanitary napkins are distributed in various areas; accurate information regarding the do's and don'ts during menstruation is also given to the girls and women. They are helped with their queries relating to menstruation.

A large number of adolescent girls and women are still not aware of menstrual hygiene practices and also follow a lot of myths related to menstruation. This group is the target audience for CHF's MHM Program.

In the year 2020-2021, Child Help Foundation addressed the queries of the women and distributed sanitary pads in various locations in Maharashtra, Odisha, Assam, Nagaland, West Bengal, and Karnataka.

Outcome:

Throughout the project, Child Help Foundation (CHF) has observed that the information provided to a group of women and girls relating to menstruation is passed down to other females. This behavior of passing down the information has been an achievement for the coordinators and the CHF team. It is also noted that the girls and women, who had been reluctant in attending these sessions, now come forward freely to clarify their queries.

By the year 2030, CHF wants to achieve universal and equitable access to safe drinking water for all. We are determined to work towards providing affordable sanitary and hygiene tools to the underprivileged, so they live a life with dignity and self-respect.




























GENDER EQUALITY (SDG5)

Under the Sustainable Development Goal 5 (SDG-5) mentioned by the United Nations (UN), Gender Equality has been considered more than just a fundamental human right. It is a necessary prerequisite for a peaceful, prosperous and sustainable world.

Gender inequality remains a major barrier to human development. Often, women and girls are discriminated against in various sectors of life. Crimes against women are high which creates negative consequences for the development of their capabilities and their freedom of choice. Gender inequalities, and their social causes, impact India's sex ratio, making it highly unequal.


Child Help Foundation (CHF) is working towards creating an equal platform for both boys and girls in the community. Our goal is to promote the education of the girl child. Our Gender Equality Program is aligned with the National Program 'Beti Padhao, Beti Bachao'. Our grassroots level programs are eliminating gender biases and creating a level playing field for both boys and girls. We believe that women need to be empowered to stand up for their Fundamental as well as Human Rights.

Recreate Workshop:

Self-defense is a countermeasure that involves defending the health and well-being of oneself from the wrong. The use of the right to self-defense has been justified by the law in many parts of the world. Upholding one's dignity against abuse should be given the recognition it deserves.

The pandemic has also led to a sharp increase in violence against women and girls. With lockdown rules in place, many women are confined at home with their abusers, struggling to access basic services that are very well within their rights.

The best feeling anyone can possess is to be sure that they can protect themselves. This is the kind of empowerment that needs to be assured to every woman, especially in a patriarchal society like India.





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GENDER EQUALITY (SDG5)

By knowing self-defense techniques, one can be aware of what can be done in a difficult situation. During the last Financial Year, Child Help Foundation (CHF), in partnership with the Recreate Team, arranged an Empowerment Self-Defense Workshop. This workshop helped them learn and understand easy-to-use techniques such as awareness, assertiveness, and verbal confrontation skills along with safety strategies and physical techniques to prevent, resist, and escape violent assaults by a possible assaulter.

The main idea behind the concept of the Empowerment Self-Defense Workshop was to empower women to fight for their rights and to prevent gender-based violence and discrimination. This, in turn, creates opportunities for a life with dignity and wellbeing. This self-defense workshop was conducted with the CHF staff at the Headquarters located in Mira Road, Palghar.



There were few learnings from this workshop, like:

- Self-defense is anything we say, or believe that helps to keep us safe.
- Our actions don't have to be fair, logical, or polite, we don't need to be nice.
- In self-defense we do not need to be a winner, we just need to ensure that our safety goal is to get away. They even emphasized the importance of having a firm voice.
- The five emergency self-defense tips are: Yell, Run, Fight, Tell and Speak.

By adopting and strengthening policies towards equal opportunities for all, CHF is a firm advocate of gender equality. By the year 2030, we hope to empower as many women as possible and educate the girl child population.




























ZERO HUNGER(SDG2)


The 2nd Sustainable Development Goal by the UN aims to combat hunger and lays out steps to deal with the food insecurity issue faced by the economically and socially backward sections of society. Currently, it is estimated that nearly 690 million people go hungry each day, which is 8.9 percent of the world population. In light of the pandemic caused by COVID-19, even the populations of the developed countries have been facing problems regarding hunger-a growing matter.





In the 2020 Global Hunger Index, India ranks 94th out of the 107 countries with adequate data to calculate 2020 GHI scores. With a score of 27.2, India has a level of hunger that has severe implications. According to this report, 14 percent of India's population is undernourished. Despite multiple initiatives by the Central and State governments, we still have a long way to go to close the gap between food distribution and hunger.

Child Help Foundation's Zero Hunger program ensures that no child goes to sleep with an empty stomach. Our Roti Ghar initiative, in partnership with the Khushiyaan Foundation, feeds warm and nutritious meals to 1,800 underprivileged children daily. Many of these kids find it difficult to carry out daily activities like going to school because of health issues caused by undernutrition. In the last 3 and a half years of this program, 50 percent of these beneficiaries have seen an improvement in their health, and 70 percent of them have resumes going back to school.





ZERO HUNGER(SDG2)

Despite being the largest democracy and one of the largest populations in the world, India is home to 46.6 million stunted children, a third of the world's total as per Global Nutrition Report 2018. With more initiatives like Roti Ghar and our individual contributions, we will be able to tackle this social evil altogether.





Success story

- Sonakshi (name changed), a beneficiary under the Roti Ghar program, lives in a slum in the Thane district. She has been coming 1st in her school for the last 2 years. She thanks the CHF team for supporting and guiding her through her academic journey, and for providing her with necessary stationery supplies. She envisions becoming a doctor one day, to help the needy.
- Roshni & Priti (name changed) from Thane slum, wished to become professional dancers and dreamt of performing on stage. Today, these girls are choreographers, after receiving help from Khushiyaan Foundation, who supported their dreams by training them under professional dance mentors. Roshni and Priti are star performers for several stage shows and events in Mumbai and Thane. They are also training other kids with similar dreams, by sharing their stories and encouraging them to turn their dreams into reality. They want people to believe in a world where everything is possible with the right support and mentorship. They express their gratitude to Child Help Foundation and Khushiyaan Foundation for believing in them, and many others.






































HUMANITARIAN RELIEF

Humanitarian Aid is a short-term material and logistical assistance provided to people who are in need. Among the people in need are the homeless, refugees, and victims of natural disasters, wars, and famines. Child Help Foundation (CHF) under its Humanitarian Relief initiative, has incorporated three Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) of the UN - SDG 11, 13, and 17.

SDG 11 talks about making cities sustainable by creating career and business opportunities, safe and affordable housing, and building resilient societies and economies. SDG 13 intends to take measures against Climate Change by taking efforts to integrate disaster risk measures, sustainable natural resource management, and human security into national development strategies. SDG 17 aims at dealing with humanitarian crises with strong global partnerships and cooperation. CHF is a determined advocate of providing aid during calamities, coordinating volunteers for relief work, and strengthening ties at the district and state levels.

During these tough times, accelerated by the pandemic as well as natural disasters in many parts of the country, CHF has done its best to assist the underprivileged communities, throughout India, in all ways possible.

Humanitarian Relief in The Eastern Region: West Bengal:

During the pandemic, the Child Help Foundation (CHF) team came forward to work at the grassroots level to help the community and give them new confidence throughout the lockdown.

The families who were supported by the team were daily wage earners and included the elderly, some of whom earn their livelihood by Rickshaw pulling, van and auto-driving, rakhi making, and the others work as maids, servants, and masons. Most of them had migrated from Bihar and Uttar Pradesh and belonged to the unorganized sector. The pandemic created unemployment and monetary as well as mental distress in them.









HUMANITARIAN RELIEF

During this Pandemic, CHF also conducted various awareness drives, asking people to sanitize regularly and to wear masks. People from the Below Poverty Line (BPL) were given the correct information regarding documents and ration cards and were told to keep the documents handy. The distribution process was systematically carried out by giving coupons for ration kits to the needy. The distribution kit contained everyday essentials such as puffed rice, sattu, suji, sugar, biscuits, dal, onions, mustard oil, soybeans, salt, eggs, and soaps.

The relief event was covered in Media viz. Electronic media 24 Ghanta

Odisha:

Throughout the pandemic, the Child Help Foundation team in Odisha came forward to help the underprivileged sections of the community. During the winter, the team conducted a Survey to identify the poorest sections to provide them with woolen clothes. The temperatures during winters, in Odisha, were recorded below 15 degrees celsius, causing around 3,000 deaths every year. The CHF team arranged and distributed sarees, blankets, biscuits, dolls, and winter clothes amongst them. The Odisha team catered to communities like Kendujhar (Keonjhar), Malisahi, and Kendujhar. This brought about hope in the people who were in dire need of resources. In Odisha, CHF reached out to 439 community people who were in utmost need of help, during this year.













Humanitarian Relief in The North East: Assam

The May 2020 Assam floods were a result of the flooding of the Brahmaputra River, coincided with the COVID-19 pandemic, affecting 30,000 and destroying crops across 5 districts. The CHF Team in Assam tried to help the most vulnerable families by extending their resources efficiently. Most of the people who reached out to us were living on the roads. We also distributed flood relief materials and sanitary pads to all the female beneficiaries. CHF helped these families to provide them with the support they needed to help them come out of their misery. It is a proud moment for us to say that a total of 96 families were reached out to through this relief support.





Roti Ghar 2020-21

Child Help Foundation has partnered with Khushiyaan Foundation for Roti Ghar, a project which feeds 1,800 children daily. Through our Roti Ghar program, people are working tirelessly to feed children from poor and disadvantaged backgrounds. We have fulfilled the food necessities of underprivileged children by providing them warm meals in multiple areas including, Delhi, Bangalore, Hyderabad, Airoli Sector 19 & 20, Thane East, and Thane West.

Roti Ghar was established by Chinu Kwatra, a social worker, with the hope that no children and adults should die from hunger and have an opportunity to nurture their dreams and aspirations. He realized that on one hand, the laborers work as human resources to their full potential but on the other hand, their necessities like food and shelter weren't getting fulfilled. This mission has been successful through the contributions as well as the support of various donors, volunteers, and partners.




























LIFE ON LAND

Life on earth is more than just humankind. Along with human beings, a vast diversity of animals and plants depend on the earth for their survival. The pandemic has affected these lives equally, if not worse. The infrastructural development in urban and semi-urban areas has made the lives of these animals depend on us humans. The strays in metropolitan cities and urban areas largely depend on food handed over to them by animal lovers, scavenged from the streets or from trash cans. Some animal feeders also provided their neighborhood cats and dogs with food.

The COVID-19 lockdown not only made these strays go hungry for days but also made them susceptible to various kinds of diseases. They struggled to find food and water to survive, as the people who fed them couldn't leave their houses. Understanding the depth of this situation, Child Help Foundation, in partnership with 'Street Animals', began feeding stray animals in the Mira Bhayandar stretch in Thane District.

In these times, when human survival has become difficult, the plight of the voiceless strays has become unimaginable. Many of them are finding it difficult to survive and are ending up losing their lives to

Our initiative began on 12th March 2020, with feeding about 120 animals daily, and we have been able to feed 40,230 cats, dogs, and birds to date. The CHF team reached many areas, some of which include, Mira Bhayander, Bhayander Khadi, Jesal Park, Navghar Road, and Jain Nagar, and we fed biscuits, milk, rice, and Pedigree were fed to the strays, ensuring their daily that their daily nutritional requirements are met.

Our animal feeding program also extends to rescuing abandoned dogs and sheltering them. The volunteers try to provide them with medical support in consultation with veterinarians. Our mission is to ensure that all strays are vaccinated and none of them go to sleep hungry.

With restaurants shut and people locked in the house, CHF wants to make the survival of the strays easier by providing them with basic necessities like water, food, and shelter. Being the most intelligent beings on the planet, it is we who must take charge of helping our fellow animals and be the 'voice of the voiceless.'













The increased concerns around climate change and its effects are troublesome. Earth's oceans make 3/4th of the planet's entire surface and are home to large biodiversity of marine life. This water is essential for all living organisms and makes the planet habitable. Over three billion people depend on marine and coastal biodiversity for their sustenances. However, in today's scenario, these

Having realized these issues, CHF began Beach Clean-Up programs to restore marine and coastal biodiversity. An imbalance in the two, can not only harm the flora and the fauna but also the human lives in the surroundings. Microplastics present in water and in seafood consumed by human beings can lead to multiple organ problems and developmental delays. It is we who are to be blamed for causing upheaval in nature with increasing pollution and population levels.

Beaches that are popular as tourist sights are dirty and the seawater is polluted. This is responsible for killing aquatic animals. Thus, beach clean-ups are important to curb this growing menace of plastic and other waste materials from entering our oceans. Some of the many advantages of Beach Clean-Ups could be increased tourism and a recovery in the imbalance caused in nature. The mangroves surrounding these beaches are important to maintain an ecological balance.

Child Help Foundation has partnered with For Future India Official, for cleaning beaches in Mumbai, including Arnala Beach, Danapani Beach, Gorai Beach, Juhu Beach, Khardanda Beach with 779 volunteers. We collected and removed 35,960 kgs of debris and plastic materials.

Our main goal is to spread awareness about the depleting quality of the beaches and seawater. It is important for people to know and understand how beach clean-up activities can make a significant difference, in improving human and aquatic lives as well. We also aim to increase mangrove plantations and make the beaches of Mumbai waste-free.

Beaches are more than just aesthetically pleasing tourist attractions. They support multiple biological communities. Every single breath we take comes from the oceans, and thus, it is important for us to not only be aware of saving them, but also implementing this knowledge by taking responsible actions.









Daan Ustav, also known as "India's Festival of Giving', is celebrated every year from 2nd to 8th October. This year, CHF celebrated Daan Ustav in high spirits in partnership with Xondhan Foundation, with the women, children, and the elderly of Assam, by spreading joy among them. We arranged, "Sanitary Pad Library", a Menstrual Hygiene Awareness program, and also distributed more than 2,100 sanitary napkins among students and local women in the Bhatipara, Malegar, Baniyapara, Goalpara, and Bongaigaon areas of Assam.

During the week, we visited the Laalmati Bagheswari LP School, a primary school in Bongaigaon, Assam, and distributed exercise kits, notebooks, stationeries, and color charts, among 51 kids. We also went to Sanbari Tilapara LP School, in Bongaigaon, Assam, and gave exercise kits to 30 children. We distributed masks and stationery including colors, drawing books, and charts along with chocolates to 20 students from Assam Engineering College Campus Ip School in Guwahati, Assam.

On the closing day of Daan Ustav, our volunteers prepared lunch for the inmates of Jai Mata Di Oldage home in Guwahati, Assam. We also provided them with hygiene kits and dresses. This senior citizens' home is lesser-known and based at a remote location, but the joy of reaching them superseded all the difficulties.

Women's Day:















World Cancer Prevention Day:
