For the duration of this grand pilgrimage, which commenced on July 7, 2024, Child Help Foundation and Filaantro undertook the noble mission of providing over 15,000 free meals to the devotees for the pilgrims at the yatra as well as for those arriving at the railway station for the pilgrimage. The Rath Yatra, a vibrant spectacle of devotion and culture, brings together people from diverse backgrounds, all gathered to witness the divine journey of Lord Jagannath to his aunt's residence.

Organizing meals on such a massive scale required substantial effort and coordination. With support from generous donors and the tireless efforts of volunteers, the initiative successfully ensured that no devotee went hungry during this auspicious festival.

The project was not only a testament to the power of collective effort but also highlighted the importance of sharing and compassion during moments of communal celebration. The

contributions of donors, whether through financial support or by spreading the word, played a crucial role in the success of this endeavour.

Speaking on the food distribution, Mr. Shaji Varghese (Chief Executive Officer of Child Help Foundation) said *"It has become an annual tradition for us to conduct a free food distribution to the devotees during the yearly Jagannath Rath Yatra. Heartbreak and Hope: A Father's Plea to Save His Twins Battling Neonatal Issues

"Being a parent is one of the best feelings in the world. I and Veena were so excited to welcome our child. We are heartbroken after seeing our twins' condition. It feels that I have failed as a parent, as I can't afford their treatment."

Surath and Veena were on cloud nine when they were blessed with twins on June 13, but their happiness faded the moment they learned that their twins were suffering from neonatal issues.

Their twins are currently admitted to Medcover Women and Child Hospital, Hyderabad (16.6 km from Hyderabad Deccan Railway Station). They need an immediate NICU for around 50 days, and the estimated cost is 7,50,000/- (seven lakh fifty thousand rupees only) for each child.

Surath lives with his wife and parents. He works at a welding shop, whereas his wife is a housewife. They live in a rental apartment in Hyderabad. He is the sole breadwinner in the family, and it's impossible for them to afford the treatment cost. Currently, he is borrowing money from his loved ones, but that can't cover the expense of treatment.

However, your contribution can save the lives of Surath and Veena's twins. We request that you donate as much as you can. Also, share this story with your friends and family.

Disability Pride Month: What Is It and Why Is It Important?

When we hear 'Pride Month, our mind often goes to the LGBTQIA+ community but there is a different kind of Pride Month which is equally important.

The history of Disability Pride Month began on March 12, 1990, when thousands of people marched to the White House to demand the government pass the Americans with Disabilities Act. In an act of civil demonstration and to show how 'able-normative' the world is, many activists stepped out of their wheelchairs and crawled the steps of the White House, resulting in 104 activists being arrested. This moment has been immortalized as the 'Capitol Crawl'.

However, their efforts bore fruit on July 26, 1990, when the American President, George H. W. Bush, signed the Americans with Disabilities Act, which prohibits discrimination against disabled people. Since then, each July is celebrated as Disability Pride Month.

Disability Pride Month is inspired by similar movements like the LGBT Pride and Black Pride. It is a month to celebrate the contributions of disabled activists and shed light on the issues of disabled people and the social stigma they face.

Disability Pride Month is often celebrated by parades. Unfortunately, India doesn't have a massive movement related to disability. Hence, it isn't celebrated on a large scale. However, we can make some changes in our daily habits that can make this world a better place for disabled people.

Technology has been extremely helpful for disabled people. Many visually impaired people can use phones without relying on any additional help, due to settings like 'talk-back' and 'double click'. Various media have incorporated accessibility options, examples include The Last of Us Part II which was successfully completed by a sightless gamer. Netflix films also come with an additional audio option called 'Audio Description', which perfectly describes the ongoing events in the film helping entertainment reach disabled people.

If you are a content creator, you too can help in making this world a better place for disabled people. Make sure to add subtitles or captions in your videos which will help the deaf to personally understand the video. What's great about this is that it also helps many able-bodied people if they want to watch a video in public and don't have headphones. This not only creates a better world for the disabled but for everyone.

During the COVID pandemic, many companies shifted to a 'work-from-home' model. This new working style helped many disabled people. In fact, it has been reported that 30% more disabled people were getting employed thanks to the new working model. Many more companies need to give an option for 'work-from-home' as it allows disabled people to live an independent lifestyle. Just like with closed caption benefitting able-bodied people, the shift to work from home model will also help many more besides the disabled.

For example, many girls opt out of work because they feel unsafe in a heavily male-dominated environment, making them feel uncomfortable and they also fear that taking care of a child would be difficult while working. So work-from-home model can be beneficial to them and a shift towards it would also see a rise in women's employment. This can also potentially improve the work-life balance, that many suffer from, even men.

Shifting towards physical changes that can help disabled people, many buildings are not designed with disabled people in mind. Ramps are almost non-existent and elevators are absent in buildings not larger than three stories. This creates a hindrance to wheelchair users and old people in general. While most governmental buildings do come with a braille script, many private properties don't have text written in braille making it difficult for blind people to read the instructions.

Child Help Foundation supports a better world for disabled individuals. Child Help Foundation provided jerseys and uniforms to the Wheelchair Fencing Federation of India in Tamil Nadu.

Doctor's Felicitation

Ms. Chris Shenoy and Ms. Madhuri Chiplunkar recently visited Wockhardt Hospital, Mumbai Suburban, to honour doctors for their dedication to serving underprivileged pediatric and female patients. The event, organized in collaboration with Mangala Foundation and Filaantro, recognized both gynaecologists and paediatricians from Wockhardt Hospital and surrounding clinics.

A total of 25 doctors from Wockhardt and Bhakti Vedanta Hospitals were presented with certificates and mementoes by Dr. Mangala Patil, Ms. Chris Shenoy, and Ms. Madhuri Chiplunkar. Among those honoured were Dr. Nitu Mundhra (Neonatologist), Dr. Badshah Khan (Pediatrician), Mr. Ankit Gupta (Paediatrician), and Dr. Jagruti Ghosh (Gynaecologist). The recipients were deeply touched and expressed their gratitude for the support of Child Help Foundation (CHF) and its commitment to serving those in need.

Visit to Apollo Hospital Mumbai, Maharashtra

Ms. Chris Shenoy and Ms. Madhuri Chiplunkar went to visit Apollo hospital in Kharghar, Navi Mumbai. Rajendra Patole, Medical social worker introduced them to Ms. Sonal (Head of Operations) and Ms. Rakhi Rajendra handling the same department. All staff were briefed about Child Help Foundation and various programs and projects currently running under various SDGs. Ms. Sonal also gave a brief review regarding how they support underprivileged children and need more support for the same. The standard of procedure for any medical case intake was explained in the meeting. A meeting with Dr. Bhushan (Paediatric cardiologist) was arranged by Mr. Rajendra, Dr. Bhushan himself operates on all children who are diagnosed with heart defects. With the help of modern techniques, they do intervention surgery on children for which minimum funds are required and children are also discharged in 1 day. The hospital operations department and CHF will arrange one meeting between trustees and hospital staff for future endeavours.

The meeting was very fruitful in terms of networking as many underprivileged children can get benefit from this joint venture as per Dr. Bhushan. Social and operations department staff were very impressed with CHF's case intake protocol and programs/projects other than emergency medical support.

Update of Baby Feeding Centres

Maharashtra: During a visit by Child Help Foundation staff to Boisar and Palghar Railway Stations, it was noted that the centres are being cleaned regularly and the railway staff is cooperative. Centres at CAMA Hospital and Urban Health Centre were reported to be well-utilized and maintained, and BFCs at St. George Hospital and Sir J. J Hospital experienced lower footfall as many mothers don't visit St. George Hospital and the key to the centre at Sir J. J Hospital are kept by the nurses. The centres at Kalyan were reported to be well-maintained and a person appointed by Childline oversees the centre. The centre at Kurla observed average usage but was still well-maintained. The staff at the Kashimira Police Station gave positive feedback regarding the centre. However, the facility was deemed necessary for potential future use. Lights and fans were missing from the centre at Pune Railway Station. The volunteers sprung into action and discussed the matter with the station master.

Kerala: Centres at General Hospital and Lakeshore Hospital were reported to be well-maintained and utilized effectively. Given Chottanikkara temple's high daily footfall, the usage of the BFC was proportionately high.

Andhra Pradesh: Vizag Railway Station's high footfall, particularly for mothers with small babies, contributed to the excellent usage of the BFC.

Karnataka: BFC at Sir C V Raman Hospital 1 indicated good usage and maintenance. Sir C.V. Raman General Hospital – 2 and Sir Atalbihari Vajpayee College-1 indicate good usage. All three centres were reported to be well-maintained

Tamil Nadu: The BFC at The Institute for Child Health & Hospital for Children in Chennai served with satisfactory usage. Institute of Obstetrics and Gynecology in Chennai received effective usage of the BFC by mothers.

Bihar: BFC at Katihar Railway Station was not well-maintained

West Bengal: BFC at New Jalpaiguri Railway Station was not used widely despite being functional

Giri Pradakshina Event, Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh.

On July 20, 2024, an auspicious full moon day during the Aashaadha month, thousands of devotees undertook a spiritual journey, circumambulating the sacred hill at Simhachalam, Visakhapatnam, to seek the blessings of Sri Varaha Narasimha Swamy. This annual event, which includes a 32-km road and a 1,000-step uphill pilgrimage, draws lakhs of participants each year.

Child Help Foundation (CHF) recognized a gap in the support provided to pilgrims. Building on their initiative from last year, CHF-Vizag launched a unique program to address these overlooked needs.

With the support of Amrutanjan Health Care Ltd, New Smart Angels Play School, and MRF Consultancy, CHF mobilized 20 internal staff members and several external volunteers to serve over 20,000 devotees. The aid provided included 1,000 litres of glucose, 1,500 bottles of ORS, 4,000 packs of pain-relieving balm, 100 pain-relief spray cans, 5,000 millet and groundnut chikkis, and 2,000 packs of salted groundnuts.

The response from the devotees was overwhelmingly positive, with many expressing their gratitude for the thoughtful and novel support that alleviated their discomfort and enhanced their spiritual journey.

School Health Program

Since April, four new schools have been integrated into the School Health Program, expanding the total to fourteen schools, including ten ashram schools, one Z.P. school, and three government-aided high schools. The program continues to focus on enhancing physical and mental health through various activities, such as student health screenings, illness treatment, and capacity building via awareness sessions and counselling for both students and teachers.

In July, the following activities were carried out:

- **Health Screenings:** A total of 1,278 students from Ashram Shalas were screened during 43 health visits, with their health cards updated.
- **Illness Treatment:** Doctors diagnosed and treated 1,146 cases of illness. Additionally, five students were referred to other health institutions for further treatment.
- **Secondary Students:** 3,204 students were reached through 49 awareness sessions on various mental health topics.
- **Higher Secondary Students:** 2,353 students participated in 41 awareness sessions on different mental health topics.
- **General Health Awareness:** 6,351 students were engaged through 100 awareness sessions covering various health topics.
- **Training of Trainers:** A Mental Health Awareness training session was conducted at Man Ashram School, with 11 teachers participating.

During the visit, the Additional Municipal Commissioner of MBMC formally signed the appointment letter, officially designating CHF to initiate the Arogya Vardhini Kendra (Primary Health Centre) Project in various parts of Maharashtra.

Ration Kit Distribution Mulund, Maharashtra

On July 30, World TB Day, a nutritional kit distribution was organized at TB Hospital, Mulund. The hospital coordinated the event and invited 40 patients to receive the kits. These patients are undergoing treatment at both government and private hospitals.

The families of these patients are economically disadvantaged and often struggle to manage both the costs of treatment and the nutritional needs of their children. To support them, the distribution of ration kits is conducted monthly, providing essential nutritional support to help alleviate some of their burdens during their treatment.

Mini Science Centre Implementation

M S Maur and M S Koyaribigha School,
Barbigha, Bihar

The Mini Science Centre (MSC) project is underway at M S Maur and M S Koyaribigha Schools in Barbigha, Bihar, with support from National Fertilizers Limited. The new academic year commenced this month, and the MSC Coordinator has begun teaching Science and Mathematics using the models provided by the centre.

Feedback videos have been recorded, showcasing students' reflections on how the MSC Lab has enhanced their understanding of Science and Mathematics. The students expressed that the MSC Lab has significantly improved their grasp of these subjects, making learning more engaging and effective.

Computer Labs Inauguration Bihar

In January 2024, a Computer Lab project was initiated at Tailik School with support from National Fertilizers Limited. The lab is equipped with 20 computers and a dedicated computer teacher. By July, the MSC Coordinator began computer lessons for the students.

Additionally, two new Computer Labs were established in June 2024 at schools in the Barbigha block: Utkramit Uchch Vidhyalay, Lodhipur, and Madhya Vidhyalay Samas. The labs were inaugurated in June, and teachers were appointed in July. Following an orientation, the teachers commenced computer lessons for the students.

Computer Training Centre Project

In July, the computer training centre conducted a total of 36 classes, with 660 students in attendance. The curriculum included various subjects such as basic PowerPoint (PPT) practicals, a fast touch-typing course, MS Word, and Paint. By offering a diverse range of subjects and hands-on learning experiences, the centre is equipping students with essential digital skills crucial for their personal and professional growth.

CHF's dedication to bridging the digital divide and empowering rural children with technological proficiency is commendable. This initiative significantly enhances their overall education and future prospects, reflecting CHF's commitment to fostering digital literacy in underserved communities.

Digital Skills Project

Vikramgad, Maharashtra

Since May 2024, the Digital Skills project has been rolled out across fifteen schools in the Vikramgad block, comprising eight Z.P. schools and seven ashram schools. This initiative, in partnership with LTPCT, aims to enhance digital skills among underprivileged rural students through comprehensive computer training.

Project Overview:

- Schools Involved: 8 Z.P. schools and 7 ashram schools
- Training Labs: Installed in all fifteen schools with LTPCT's support
- Computer Trainers: Each school has a dedicated trainer following a syllabus approved by the education department

Training Details:

- Total Classes Conducted: 717
- Total Students Reached: 25,372 (5,451 unique)
- Topics Covered: History and generation of computers, WordPad and Notepad, hardware and software, Microsoft Word and Excel, booting process, Paint

On July 26th, the LTPCT team, including Jyoti, Blossom, and Akshay, visited the Sakhare Digital Lab to prepare for an upcoming visit by LTPCT trustees and government officials. They reviewed the daily schedule, data maintenance, and branding efforts. The team also examined the teacher's daily activities, syllabus, and future planning. Jyoti Ma'am interacted with the students to gather feedback on their learning experience and their enjoyment of digital skills education.
